## Introduction



- Fogo Island, Newfoundland is an island off an island. Inshore fishing communities established in early 18<sup>th</sup> century.
- Overfishing led to cod moratorium in 1992. Fogo island became a community frozen in time, with no clear way forward.
- 7<sup>th</sup> generation Fogo Islander, Zita Cobb formed Shorefast Foundation as a social enterprise to navigate a way toward a new future for the community based on its unique natural and cultural strengths.

## Lessons learned

- Understand the relevance of the past AND have a dream for the future
- Develop a great story
- Be authentic, transparent and honest
- Bring the community along with you engage and inform
- Take a holistic perspective. "We exist in relation to the whole: the whole planet, the whole of humanity, the whole of existence." (Zita Cobb)
- History, culture, landscape, people and economics all matter
- The economy underpins the places we live, and the economic system should serve the people
- Start with Asset Based Community Development
- Leadership is crucial (so is the eventual transfer to a management team)
- Share what you learn



#### FOGO ISLAND, NEWFOUNDLAND AND CANADIAN COMMUNITY

- The close-knit Fogo Island community has a deep pride in their history and connection to place and family
- There is pride in the audacity and success of Shorefast in Newfoundland and throughout Canada
- Recognized as a visionary Canadian leader, Zita Cobb has been awarded the Order of Canada

#### **FINANCIAL**

- Shorefast Foundation is a registered charity for the benefit of Fogo Islanders. Created and supported with significant donation of time and financial resources by Zita Cobb and her brothers Alan and Tony.
- Federal and Provincial governments each contributed \$5 million to build the Inn
- Over 200 Fogo Islanders work for or provide services to Shorefast
- Fogo Island Economic Development Partnership Shorefast, Municipality of Fogo Island and Fogo Island Fish Cooperative
- Charitable donors

#### HOSPITALITY AND FOOD INDUSTRY

- Tourists from around the world value the Inn as an exemplary travel experience
- Inn is recognized as a world leader in Regenerative Tourism and has won numerous hospitality and design awards

#### **ARTS COMMUNITY**

- Contemporary artists, writers, curators and artisans have participated in residencies through Fogo Island Arts

#### **ACADEMIC**


- Academic researchers engage in ocean studies, geology, community, arts and business research

#### **BUSINESS**

- The Canadian and international business community is paying attention and learning.
- Zita Cobb was recently inducted into Canadian Business Hall of Fame.

# Cultural Heritage-Punt Premises

- Restoration of existing historical buildings
- Opened in 2019 to showcase the history of the inshore fishery
- Interactive and inclusive place that encourages hands on learning
- Fishing stage, flake, punt store, punts, net loft and house
- "hold on to traditional knowledge while also sharing it with new audiences and generations" (Punt Premises on Fogo Island)



## **Environmental Sustainability**

### Goal is to "sit lightly on the land"

- Fogo Island Fish uses traditional fishing methods
- Rigorous use of local materials and traditional skills in all construction and production
- Ensure minimal impact of every input and output of the Inn
- Dining room sources food locally
- Primary activity for Inn guests is to go for a walk
- Travel to get to Fogo Island requires flight+ ferry + car

## **Economic Sustainability**

- Proceeds from social businesses reinvested in charitable programs
- Accept charitable donations
- Charitable programs operate community initiatives
- Economic Nutrition Label was created to identify economic benefit
- Cauliflower pins created to recognize value of rural places
- High cost to stay at Fogo Island Inn reflects the cost of paying fair salaries
- Tourist traffic has created opportunities for Airbnb's, campgrounds, restaurants and galleries on Fogo Island
- Is an expensive Inn economically viable and sustainable in a remote location? So far, yes, because it's more than an Inn.

## Social Sustainability

- Shorefast engaged community in many conversations based on Asset Based Community Development model
- Fogo Island Art exhibits are open to the public
- Education scholarships and recruitment/training for local residents
- Every islander invited to spend a night at the Inn.
- Community hosts provide tours to Inn guests
- Shorefast is sharing knowledge and experience with four other communities through "Community Economy Pilot Project"
- PLACE model created to identify feasibility in other locations
- Real estate prices have gone up (as elsewhere) and small size of Inn limits impact of tourists.


# Sustainable Development Goal #8

Measurement: Number of employees, number of jobs created, microlending loans issued, track how many small communities supported through shared learning, equality and diversity policy and stats




## Sustainable Development Goal #8

### Measurement

#### **Environmental measures:**

- Track number of refurbishment and restoration projects -buildings and trails
- Quantify and consider impact of inputs/outputs
- Track fish, bird and caribou populations and fish catch

#### Social measures:

- Track Fogo Island population numbers, educational enrollment (at all levels), employment stats
- Shared experience number of talks, visitors to artist shows, number of other communities engaged
- Survey resident, staff and guest satisfaction, as well as Community host engagement with Inn guests
- Track social media impact

#### **Economic measures:**

- Financial reporting
- Investment in Fogo Island- By Shorefast, charitable donations, partnerships, Government support?
- Ferry travel, (particularly by non-residents) and occupancy at other Fogo Island tourist accommodations
- # of building permits issued as well as price and availability of resident housing vis a vis comparable locations
